Kith and Kinship: Unheard Voices

"...after all, we are all the victors, or victims, of life's experience...." - Norman Cornish

Kith & Kinship: Norman Cornish & L.S Lowry exhibited at The Bowes Museum, Barnard Castle in 2024/25 brings together the evocative works of two Northern artists. The vivid realities of Cornish's Spennymoor life and Lowry's industrial views resonate deeply with the unspoken experiences of those living within the walls of HMP Deerbolt today.

Unheard Voices, a collaborative project between The Bowes Museum, Novus learners and tutors from HMP Deerbolt, and artist practitioner Jonah York, delves into themes of kith and kinship.

Novus operates in over 50 prisons across England and Wales providing enrichment opportunities for the large proportion of prison learners who have additional needs and/or didn't have a good experience of education when they were younger. Creative partnership projects such as this one are a core part of their provision, engaging learners and encouraging them to participate in education, helping them on their rehabilitative journey.

During this project, through creative workshops, poetry, in-depth exploration and discussion, participants have responded to ideas of community, identity, and place. Guided by the learners' own reflections, Unheard Voices allows incarcerated people to reshape the conversation about them through these iconic works, offering new and personal interpretations.

Opportunities like this play a crucial role in fostering a rehabilitative culture. By providing engaging and challenging activities through arts and culture, Novus and The Bowes Museum empower learners to contribute meaningfully to their environment. This experience motivates learners to positively impact their communities, supports personal growth and fosters the confidence needed to make lasting, positive changes in their lives.

Over five weeks, 32 young men from HMP Deerbolt worked alongside Jonah York to create this zine. In their words, it captures "the voices people choose not to hear" and offers a positive and constructive platform to engage with their peers, families and the wider community.

Cornish and Lowry had a deep understanding of humanity. Both painted what they saw and what they felt; nothing more, nothing less. This connection to honesty, reality and expression resonates with learners.

"I've not just seen these paintings but I've lived in them" - HMP Deerbolt Learner

Through this work, we're sharing views and perspectives that audiences might not have heard before. Through it, the voices of today resonate with the art of the past, creating a narrative around place, hope, and aspiration.


