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Unheard Voices project transforms literacy education at HMP Deerbolt through art.

An innovative project titled 'Unheard Voices', was introduced to literacy lessons at HMP Deerbolt in County Durham, inspired by The Bowes Museum's highly acclaimed *Kith and Kinship: Norman Cornish and L. S. Lowry* exhibition.

Deerbolt is a prison and young offender institution, for men aged 18 and over. The initiative aimed to integrate art into literacy lessons to inspire the learners and enhance their functional skills, using creativity as a tool to overcome barriers and challenges they have faced within traditional educational settings.

The project was delivered through workshops to over 15 male learners, aged 18 – 25. Working with The Bowes Museum and a creative facilitator, Jonah York, learners and tutors explored the exhibition's thematic, community, place, kith and kin.

As the learners developed their confidence, they discussed the artwork from the exhibition they resonated with, sketched, and reflected through letters to themselves, their families and support networks. The learner's responses brought to life the relevance of Norman Cornish and L. S. Lowry's artwork today, enabling the museum to gather unique perspectives and insights into navigating key themes explored in the exhibition, namely community, brotherhood and chosen family.

The output of the project culminated in co-produced soundscape and zine with new and varied interpretations of the works, representing the voices of the region's community through the learner's own sense of place, hope and aspiration. The front cover of the zine was produced using AI technology to reflect the style of Cornish and Lowry, and the design of its content incorporates descriptions, reflections, quotes and sketches from the learners and images of the artwork that appealed to them, capturing what they described as their "unheard voices", "the voices that people chose not to hear".

Unheard Voices is the first project in a co-production programme, set to continue until 2027, made possible by the generous support of The John Horseman Trust. Using The Bowes Museum's collection and upcoming exhibitions as a way of embedding literacy into artistic exploration, learners have been empowered to express themselves while gaining crucial educational and life skills.

The programme is supported by Novus, a not-for-profit social enterprise that delivers education, training and employment to adults and young people in UK prisons, and HMP Deerbolt. Together, staff members at HMP Deerbolt and Sarah Hartley, Novus National Lead for Creative Strategies have extensive years of experience in education and the prison system, and their expertise ensured the programme is tailored to meet the complex needs of learners.

Sarah Hartley, NOVUS National Lead for Creative Enrichment commented,

"At Novus we are committed to providing creative enrichment opportunities that go beyond traditional educational provision, aligning with Ofsted's aim to promote inclusivity and meet the needs of all learners. Projects like the one with The Bowes Museum provide an opportunity for foster social cohesion, encourage reflection on societal diversity, and act as a bridge between

communities. By exposing learners to different cultures, these projects enhance understanding, tolerance and engagement in a safe, supportive environment, offering a positive outlet for expression and learning."

"Creative enrichment projects like this one with The Bowes Museum offer our learners a real development opportunity. Working with Jonah allowed them to do something different, spend time creating and take pride in the work and themselves.
